
Common Core Curriculum



Learning Outcomes

- Developing the **academic English skills** you need for university studies:
 - ✓ Identify and distinguish between main arguments and supporting details in spoken and written academic texts
 - ✓ Express a **critical academic stance**, in written and spoken forms, through critical reading and listening
 - ✓ Construct clear and structured arguments with skilful integration of academic sources through writing and speaking
 - ✓ Demonstrate control of **grammatical accuracy** and **lexical appropriacy** in academic communication

A stance needs to be:

- cautious (use hedging e.g. 'might', 'probably', 'possibly' when appropriate)
- well-justified (use ideas from academic sources through citation and referencing to justify a stance)
- *critical* (acknowledge **counter-arguments** and **rebuttals** of those counter-arguments)
- academic in tone (not personal / emotional)



What course will I take?

- Students in the BSc (Actuarial Science) and BASc (Applied AI) programmes are required to take CAES9821.
- Students who are majoring in maths-related majors (i.e., decision analytics, mathematics, risk management and statistics) should take CAES9821.
- Students majoring in all other science majors should take CAES9820.

When will I take this course?

What will you learn?

- use appropriate linguistic features in different texts in the science fields
- explain science to non-specialists in writing
- develop oral presentation skills
- learn English independently

The three components of CAES9820







- You will write a popular science article for a non-specialist audience
- This will be based on a a research paper from your discipline
- You will research the topic and repackage the information for the target reader

- You will design and carry out an oral presentation based on your popular science article
- The target audience will be your classmates
- The audience will have scientific knowledge but will be from other disciplines

- You will decide which area of English you would like to study
- You will design and carry out a self-study programme over the course
- You will write an honest reflection of your selfstudy experience

The three components of CAES9821



- You will be given a case study and some data
- You will work in groups and with your group you will carry out some background research on the case study topic
- Individually, you will write an introduction to the case study using the relevant literature

- With your group you will analyse the data from the case study using statistical models.
- As a group you will write up the case study report
- You will need to collaborate with your group and divide up the work fairly

- In groups you will choose a professionally published article for an oral presentation.
- Your group will read the article and decide which parts to present.
- As a group you will present the article to your classmates.
